

# **Sekumpul Waterfall**

With water cascading rapidly from a mighty 80 metre high, these mammoth sized waterfalls are surrounded by lush green forests, overgrown with thickets of ferns and hanging vines, making it feel like a scene from Avatar. It is definitely the most beautiful waterfall in Bali.

The hike to Sekumpul waterfall is fairly steep. It is however a beautiful hike through a deep green forested valley, crossing crystal clear streams every now and then. You will be rewarded by the phenomenal view of Bali's best waterfalls. Take your time, go for a swim in the refreshingly cold turquoise lagoon, have a little picnic and enjoy the spray of the magnificent falls on your skin. It is very relaxing, in fact, therapeutic.

Entrance fee is required. The fee includes a tour guide for the entire trip around the waterfalls.

TIP: Wear sensible footwear as some of the areas can be slippery. You have to cross streams, so good grip sandals or trainers is advisable.


# Aling-aling Waterfall

Famed for its cliff jumping and waterfall sliding actions, this is the perfect destination for adventure seekers. From a tiny 5 metre drop for younger children up to 20 metre killer stunts for the daredevils, the thrills and spills of a trip to Aling Aling will surely make your heart jump.

Aling Aling Waterfall is located in the charming village of Sambangan. This wondrous waterfall is surrounded by a luscious jungle. The path cuts through beautiful rice terraces before descending into the deep green valley.

There is a series of waterfalls in Alina Alina and a few lovely rock pools for swimming.

The walk from Aling Aling Waterfall is relatively easy. It is a picturesque hike through the tropical forests with a lookout point to witness an aerial view of the waterfalls.





## **Mount Batur**

Epic sunrise, stunning views and fascinating forests, add Mount Batur to your Bali bucket list and thank me later.

At sunrise, the glistening orange and gold rays bursting from the silhouette of nearby Mount Agung are unbelievably beautiful. The panoramic landscapes of this active volcano rising from lush green valleys and pristine lakes below will leave you starstruck. The climb at an ungodly hour to catch the sunrise from the peak is totally worthwhile.

Geologists believe that Mount Batur sits in a super volcano that used to be 3500 metres above sea level. A huge eruption over 25000 years ago took a huge chunk of the volcano which collapsed into a chamber. Now, Mount Batur, the second highest peak in Bali stands handsomely at 1717 metres. The big chamber is now filled by a lake named Danau Batur.

A local guide is required to trek up the mountain. There are companies that offer pick-up and drop-off from your locations too. Their costs often include a guide. Here are some quick facts about Mount Batur:

- Distance: 3 5 km (2-3 miles) return
- Elevation Gain: 500 m (1,650 feet)
- Top Elevation: 1,717 metres (5,633 feet)
- Difficulty: Moderate
- Duration: 2 4 hours return

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## Munduk

Jatiluwih, recognised as a World UNESCO site is still under the tourists radar. The accessibility of this region keeps the Kuta and Canggu crowd away. Make sure you make your way there before the next Bali swina is built!

Lovina, best known for dark spinner dolphins frequenting along its coast, is a low key beach destination. It has a charming feel of old Bali.
